Undergraduate Study Abroad students can study at Westfield House in either the Autumn, Winter or the Spring semester. Semester dates for the 2024/25 academic year are as follows:

Programme Options

Whilst studying abroad at Westfield House, students typically select four or five modules to study for the semester. Each module is equivalent to 3 US credits, or 75 ECTS credits. Students may elect to take courses from the following options:

1. Westfield House Modules

Each year Westfield House publishes a list of the modules it intends to offer, in the following subject areas:

- Classical and Theological Languages
- English Literature
- History
- Human & Social Sciences
- Mathematics & Natural Sciences
- Music
- Philosophy
- Religious Studies and Theology

The courses that will be taught in 2023/24 are listed on the following page. Students may work with their programme advisor and enrol in any Westfield House course for credit, with prior approval of the relevant department head.

2. "Cambridge Experience"

Students with a grade point average of 3.0 or higher may enrol in one or two 3 credit "Cambridge Experience" module(s). Students will apply to be granted leave to attend university lectures in a variety of subject areas. Tutorial supervisions and assessments for students are arranged by Westfield House. Course equivalencies must be approved by the relevant department head.

3. Theology Majors

Additional courses are available for theology majors; please contact Westfield for details

4. Additional Courses

"British Life & Culture" is a required course for undergraduate, study abroad students. It counts for 1 unit of elective. In addition, all students take the Westfield House "Study Skills" course which runs throughout each term and supports students during their studies.

Spring Semester

The spring semester is a short, intensive term where students may select two of the offered modules. The focus is on Britain and all modules will include field trips to different parts of England. In addition, all students will take the British Life and Culture seminar.

¹For a module to be offered a minimum class size of three is normally required. In some special cases, however, an exception could be made (e.g. a student requires the module in order to satisfy their programme of studies requirements at their home institution). The 3-credit Cambridge Experience is always offered in both semesters.




Cambridge Experience Research Project and Seminars (3 credit hours)

Students with a grade point average of 3.0 or higher are invited to enrol in one or two 3 credit "Cambridge Experience" module(s). Students will apply to be granted leave (permission) to attend university lectures in a variety of subject areas. Westfield will arrange weekly supervisions with an expert in the subject. Students can choose modules in their majors, or in other fields of interest. Course equivalencies must be approved by the relevant department head in the student's home institution.

At the end of the semester, students will participate in the 'Cambridge Experience' seminar and present their papers to colleagues in seminar.

Previous students have taken courses at the faculties of History, Divinity, Modern and Medieval Languages, and Human, Social, and Political Sciences.

Students that took part in Cambridge Experience courses received a personalised approach to subjects, where they could explore topics of interest to them, while improving their writing and discussion skills in the process.

Accommodation

All our accommodation is self catering and we do not offer any meal plans. The kitchens come stocked with all the pots and pans you will need, and you will have your own designated space in the refrigerator, freezer and cupboards. The laundry facilities are free, and bedding and towels are provided. The entire campus, including the residences, is connected to the University of Cambridge fibre optic internet.

Luther Hall (pictured) includes 12 en suite bedrooms, 11 of which are capable of twin (double) occupancy and a fully accessible ground floor bedroom. Luther Hall also has two fully equipped kitchens, a common dining area, lounge and common room, laundry facilities and an indoor bicycle storage space.

26A includes 10 bedrooms over two floors, with a shared, double shower room on each floor. It has one fully equipped kitchen, dining room, lounge and common room and laundry facilities. There is a covered bicycle store next to the building.

In addition, Westfield House has a one bedroom flat, a 2 bedroom house and a 4 bedroom house for students to share.
